
Minnesota Immigrant Contributions



Minnesota is divided into eight Congressional Districts and includes 87 counties.

Total Population 5,419,171

Immigrants help drive the economy.



72 percent of immigrants in the state are in the labor force, a bit higher than the rate for all adults in the state.

\$49,156 median household income for immigrants.

\$61,492 median household income for all households.

Immigrants work in many occupations, both low- and high-wage, but are more likely to work in the lowest-wage occupations than U.S.-born workers.

Immigrants are important voices for our future.

186,388 Naturalized citizen voting age population

Many immigrants in the state have high levels of education and work in high-wage occupations, but just as many are working in low-wage occupations, suggesting very different but important contributions to the economy.
